60TH ANNIVERSARY IN IRELAND - EIL / AFS IRELAND



1964 was a pivotal year in the USA, marked by the signing of the Civil Rights Act and Martin Luther King Jr. receiving the Nobel Peace Prize. Amidst this, eight young Americans arrived at Shannon airport on Ireland's west coast. They were welcomed by host families who escorted them to Dublin. Maeve Binchy was part of the group that initiated the first EIL program, which included a visit to Dáil Éireann and a meeting with Jim Larkin Junior, an advocate for workers' rights.

The progress of EIL in Ireland faced challenges due to the Troubles in the North, but a dedicated group of volunteers successfully registered the organisation in 1988. By 1989, 302 individuals participated in EIL programs, increasing to 1,460 by 1996 and peaking at 2,500 participants and over 5 million euros before the pandemic.

EIL's roots trace back to 1932 when 23 students left New York for Germany under the leadership of Dr. Donald Watt, who envisioned an "experiment in International Living" (EIL) to foster understanding among nations. Initially seen as radical, the homestay concept proved successful and led to EIL being recognised as a Peace Messenger organisation by the UN in 1989.

AFS, originally the American Field Service, began in 1915 during World War I, with volunteers aiding in France. After World War II, AFS launched a student exchange program in 1946, which evolved into AFS Intercultural Programs. EIL Ireland joined the AFS network in 2017, representing both organisations in Ireland.

While school programs remain central to EIL's mission, the organisation has also fostered cultural initiatives, such as conflict resolution programs linking youth from Northern Ireland with peers in Israel, Palestine, South Africa, Armenia, and Azerbaijan.

The first EIL Explore Scholarship occurred in 1994, sending young people to Japan. To date, over 1 million euros have funded scholarships, allowing exploration of more than 50 countries. Since 2003, EIL Ireland has received support from the Irish government and other partners, showcasing resilience and quality, especially post-pandemic.

Thank you for your support over the past 60 years; we look forward to the next 60!

















CULTURAL GROUPS



EIL welcomed **1393** participants on cultural programmes in 2023 including Road Scholar groups on the Best of Ireland, Town and Country, Countryside and Culture, Best of South, Best of North, Coast and Family programmes.

2023 also saw the successful return of a Faculty Led Group from East Carolina University through our partner Academic Experiences Abroad (AEA).

Cultural groups are guided around Ireland through a combination of Group Leaders and Local Experts such as Denis Kissane in Kerry who has extensive and intimate knowledge of the county's history, culture, and landscape. Denis talks to groups about the transformation of Kerry over the years from a personal perspective.

Lionel Pilkington, an expert speaker on Anglo-Irish Literature, regals our Road Scholar participants with his love of Yeats at Glenlo Abbey. Lionel is a Professor of English and Creative Arts at the University of Galway.

EIL Cultural Groups Department strives to provide participants with unique educational experiences through experts such as Dennis and Lionel, as well as other highly qualified academics, story tellers, musicians, and characters.





CULTURAL GROUPS

In 2023, the department began working with a new software package, 'Tourplan', to improve operational efficiency, and in the off season we undertook a comprehensive review of providers to ensure we maintain and improve quality standards for the 2024 season ahead which will mark our 30th year in partnership with Road Scholar.

2023 saw us improve our Net Promoter Score (NPS) by 6 points, bringing us to 66 overall with further improvement targeted for the year ahead. 2023 saw us face many challenges with the integration of Tourplan, the staffing issues faced by many hotels and restaurants, and many participants getting Covid-19. However, the team's hard work and support of each other saw the NPS increase in spite of these issues.

For the coming year, 2024, EIL anticipates near 1600 participants across our Road Scholar programmes and the arrival of students from AFS Thailand.

STUDY ABROAD



The Study Abroad department is dedicated to fostering intercultural understanding among young people from around the world through its international Secondary School Study Abroad programs. These initiatives are designed to enhance cross-cultural learning within schools and communities while maintaining strong partnerships with organisations such as AFS, Federation EIL, and the European Federation of Intercultural Learning, as well as community-based volunteers both in Ireland and abroad.

The department operates two main sub-departments: the Inbound sub-department, which facilitates the arrival of Secondary School students to Ireland, and the Outbound sub-department, which oversees the departure of Irish students to study abroad.

In 2023, EIL/AFS Ireland hosted 226 participants across eight communities, with significant concentrations in Clare, Mayo, Waterford, Monaghan, Cork, and Meath. The cohort included students from diverse global regions, thanks to newly established partnerships in destinations such as Chile, Spain, and Hong Kong.

Additionally, EIL/AFS Ireland facilitated the outbound mobility of students to various European countries in 2023, including France, Germany, Belgium, and Spain. Notably, while students did not venture to other continents, there was a remarkable 160% increase in the number of students leaving Ireland to study abroad, compared to 2022.

The Study Abroad programmes extend beyond language acquisition; they focus on building lasting connections. Owen, a participant in the programme, encapsulated his experience by stating,

AFS: IMPACT OF HOSTING ON FAMILIES

AFS views the hosting experience as a transformative educational program for families. Based on a robust educational methodology developed over 75+ years of expertise in intercultural exchange, the AFS Host Family Learning Journey is a curriculum designed to engage host families with content related to intercultural learning at every step of their experience, preparing them to embrace individuals from diverse cultural backgrounds and build their intercultural awareness and understanding every step of the way. Additionally, one of the key promises of the AFS hosting experience is that it will foster lifelong connections and allow the student to leave the experience as a family member.

Main Benefits of Hosting

A survey carried out by AFS asked families to select from a list of benefits they gained as a result of the AFS hosting experience, allowing for multiple selections The top three were:

- **Cultural Learning and Exchange**: Most families (73% of respondents) identified the primary benefit as the opportunity to learn about and experience a different culture and way of life
- **Cultural Sharing**: The second most common answer (57% of respondents) indicated they benefited from sharing their culture with the hosted student
- Expansion of the Family: The third (56% of respondents) believed they benefited from having new extended family members. As described in the open-ended responses, the family grew by adding the host student as a new family member, and often, their home families are considered extended family members by the host family as well.

STUDY ABROAD

Personal Growth and Development as Global Citizens

In addition to the general benefits of the hosting experience for the families and their children, AFS also asked families to rate their learnings in terms of specific skills and attitudes that we want learners of all ages to develop as a result of their engagement with an AFS program. These abilities derive from our educational framework for active global citizenship. They include:

- Adaptability: Understanding situational cues, as well as different norms and behaviours, and adjusting accordingly and effectively.
- **Critical thinking:** Being able to look at things from different perspectives and challenge one's assumptions and beliefs before acting or making a decision.
- Self-awareness: Being aware of one's feelings, thoughts and behaviours and understanding how these have been influenced by the cultural groups that one belongs to.
- Open-mindedness: Being open to considering ideas and opinions that are new or different to one's own.
- Valuing difference: Appreciating diversity and displaying respect for people with diverse backgrounds, attitudes, opinions, lifestyles and values.
- Effective Communication: Conveying ideas, opinions, and feelings effectively and appropriately, as well as accurately interpreting what others communicate.
- **Empathy:** Developing a more profound concern and sensitivity for others by understanding and relating to their feelings, needs and experiences.
- Global awareness: Taking a broad view and using a global lens when approaching issues, being aware of the local implications of global challenges and vice-versa.
- Change-making: Having a sense of co-responsibility and taking action to have a positive impact on one's community and the world.



The AFS survey questionnaire asked respondents to rate their perceived improvements related to these abilities on a 1-5 scale (with 1 being no improvement and five significant improvement). For instance, families rated a high average of 4 for increased curiosity about other countries and cultures due to their experience as a host family. Average ratings ranged from 3.3 to 4, indicating positive improvements across all these abilities - see graph below.



The improvements reported by our host families match those seen in the ratings reported by AFS exchange students. This finding reinforces the notion that host families are also actual participants in educational exchange programs, reporting learning outcomes similar to those of our exchange students.

Despite these positive findings, we identified areas where host family growth could be improved compared to our students. According to the AFS Framework for Active Global Citizenship, program beneficiaries (students, host families, etc.) can expect to improve in four areas of global citizenship:

- 1. value and belong,
- 2. inquire critically,
- 3. understand and relate, and
- 4. take action.

GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

Explore is EIL/AFS Ireland's flagship outbound programme that provides scholarships of overseas intercultural learning adventures for Irish citizens which challenge participants to become global citizens. Explore is a programme that supports participants with an interest in global issues to travel abroad for the purpose of cultural immersion, volunteering, or language education through a variety of awards.

In 2023, Explore provided scholarships for 28 participants and we were delighted to see all participants go on and complete an Explore programme with a dedicated budget of over €91,474. Our 28 participants went on various learning adventures across the world to places like: Denmark, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Mexico, Spain, USA and Vietnam.



VOLUNTEER NETWORK

One of our greatest assets at EIL/AFS Ireland is the rich diversity of our volunteer network, which plays a crucial role in the operation of our organisation, from the Board level to providing essential support for current participants.

In 2023, 56 individual volunteers contributed to various Explore events, including the Read-a-thon, Interview & Selection Day, Enrolment Day, Pre-Departure, and Welcome Back events, as well as offering administrative and marketing assistance. A total of 85 individual volunteers participated in at least one EIL/AFS event throughout the year, with over 75% of them actively engaging in multiple activities.

Additionally, four volunteers attended the AFS Volunteer Summer Summit in France in 2023, where they networked and collaborated with volunteers from across the AFS global network.






