National Director's Foreword

2020 has been an extraordinary year.

The beginning of 2020 started with new hope and vigour that things may turn around after unprecedented challenges of the past year. Even after the news broke that Coronavirus had reached our shores, we were still optimistic for a better year. In March, after much deliberation, and with strict SOP in place, we proceeded with a Leadership Retreat with Board, Staff and Key Volunteers getting together for reflection and planning for the future. Little did we know the havoc that would soon be unleashed not just on Malaysia but the world.

Following a WHO Announcement on the Global Pandemic on 6th March, AFS International followed suit with an announcement of Program Suspension for all AFS Programs on the 13th March.

March & April 2020 saw us fighting against time to send all hosted students back to their homes safely and the return of all our students who were abroad. AFS Staff and Volunteers around the world worked around the clock trying to keep up with the changes that were happening by the hour. Lockdowns, borders and airports closing, airlines ceasing operation, flight re-routes were challenges on top of having to adapt to a lifestyle of The New Normal caused by the virus - i.e. temperature checks, masking up, working from home, online meetings etc.

To ensure that all our participants continue with their Intercultural Learning despite having their program cut short, AFS International curated the Global Competence Certificate - Special Edition which was adapted from the award-winning Global Competence Certificate developed by AFS for our 18+ participants.



The program was well received and it also provided a safe space for our participants to meet their peers from all around the world, manage their confusion, anger and frustration as well as make sense of the ever changing world around them.

Although there was no in-person exchanges, the YES Abroad Program sponsored by the US State Department still continued and we hosted the YES Students virtually. The students had language classes, cultural activities and virtual experiences with their Malaysian host families.

We also had a silver lining in October when the Kakehashi Program went ahead and we were able to send students to Japan on the program that is fully sponsored by the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology Japan (MEXT).

We managed to secure sponsorship from MCIS Life for School Teachers to participate in a Global Competence Certificate - At Home Program, which ran for 5 weeks in November.

AFS Malaysia was also given the honour of hosting the AFS Asia-Pacific Initiative's (AAI) Volunteer Recognition Ceremony that was held virtually on International Volunteers Day on the 5th December. The "best volunteer" selected from all nine participating countries took part in training sessions and forums prior to the event and took center stage in the online ceremony streamed live on facebook and zoom.

2020 has been difficult financially, but we managed to keep afloat through government subsidies, sponsorships and cost cutting measures.

Nevertheless, we are blessed with the greatest resource available, our volunteers, board and staff who supported us wholeheartedly in this difficult time.



Chairperson's Foreword

The impact of Covid-19 has taught us much about how quickly the world can change and has demonstrated our ability to collaborate, adapt and find new ways forward in unforgiving circumstances. The loss of many lives the world over will remain a constant reminder of the fragility of life, how connected we are, and the impact of globalisation on us all.

On behalf of the Board, I would also like to thank the management staff for volunteering to take salary reductions during these trying times. When we come into a crisis like the one we have right now—where it's a difficult time for the economy, for workers, people are losing their jobs, people don't know what to expect—their sacrifice is a signal that they understand that every little bit helps towards the organization's survival and future. Our volunteers too have shown resilience, understanding and patience by continuing to be invested in the AFS brand, vision and mission. Thank you for your continuous support.

The global economy is expected to recover by end 2021 and borders will re-open cautiously, but we are confident that the strategic calls we have made and our clear focus for 2021 will deliver an optimistic 2021 financial performance. Moving forward, we remain hopeful that we can continue to connect, collaborate and innovate for the benefit of all our stakeholders across the world.





PROGRAM OVERVIEW: SENDING

2020 was certainly a year that impacted every aspect of our lives and changed our norms - including AFS Programs. For many years, our programs and its operations have been conducted traditionally with in-person programming and events. The pandemic necessitated drastic changes to fit the new norm.


We experienced many unprecedented events from cutting short our program, hosting program cancellations, student repatriation, new re-entry regulations, imposition of quarantine, virtual orientation and selection, and many others.



Recruitment & Selection

During the recruitment campaign for 2020, chapters and volunteers displayed strong support and enthusiasm in promoting AFS programs. Outreach programs were conducted from the month of January until March by staff of the National Office and chapters/volunteers. Visits to schools and state education departments were part of the outreach program initiatives. However, due to a lockdown announcement in March, all of our outreach programs grounded to a halt immediately. Despite all the challenges, we had successfully attracted close to 1,205 applications.

This year was the first year we went fully digital - we no longer accepted any physical application and all submissions have to be done online. All of our selection processes, be it state level interviews or national level selections, were all conducted online, via the Zoom platform. One blessing in disguise was that we were able to go fully paperless for our recruitment and selection process.



Flagship Programs

A total of 49 students were sent off in the year 2020 and this includes our flagship programs such as the Semester Program, Year Program and Trimester Program for the Southern Hemisphere (SH). For the SH cycle, we had 11 Year Program, 3 Semester Program and 7 Trimester Program (including the PEACE Project) participants who departed on the program. However, due to the Covid-19 outbreak, they were all repatriated at the very beginning of their

exchange experience. This caused major disappointment to many of them. However, their journey did not end there as they were all invited to attend a global virtual programming - the GCC Special Edition where they had the opportunity to mingle with like-minded peers around the world to continue on their intercultural journey.

Kennedy-Lugar Youth Exchange & Study (YES) Program

40 students were selected for the Kennedy-Lugar Youth Exchange & Study Semester Program to the United States for the 2020 cohort. This program is fully funded by the U.S. Department of State, and it provides scholarship for secondary school students from countries with significant Muslim population to spend up to a year in the United States. These participants serve as "youth ambassadors" of Malaysia, in promoting mutual understanding by forming lasting relationships with their host families and communities. Unfortunately, two months after their program commenced, the participants were sent back home due to the pandemic, and they too were enrolled into the GCC Special Edition, together with the flagship program students to continue their journey virtually.



Asia Kakehashi Project

One of the most impacted programs due to the pandemic is the Asia Kakehashi Project, where 14 scholarship recipients were due to depart to Japan in March 2020. However, due to the ever-changing and ever-evolving situation in Japan, the sponsor of the program - MEXT (Japan Ministry of Education & Technology), decided to postpone the travels to October 2020. Despite the delay and the situation they were under, the participants remained high-spirited and optimistic. They safely arrived in Japan and underwent all the necessary procedures before assimilating into the local community.

Asia Kakehashi Project is a fully funded program granted by MEXT (Japan Ministry of Education & Technology), an initiative meant to build bridges between high school students in Japan and Asia. Students from 20 selected Asian countries get the opportunity to study in Japan for 6-10 months, being hosted by a Japanese high school with homestay or dorm-stay to obtain exposure and experience to Japanese education, culture and way of life. Some 40,000 Japanese high school students and 1,000 Asian high school students will be impacted by the project in developing global competence of Japanese high school students through intercultural experiences without going abroad.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW: HOSTING

At the beginning of 2020, we welcomed four (4) Japanese students who were hosted in KL and Johor respectively. However, after the outbreak, they were repatriated and sent back home which cut short their program from 10 months to 2 months.

Due to the closing of our borders, all hosting programs NH20 cycle were suspended. Although we have received interested applications from several partners across the network, we had to decline them as we were not in a position to host.

18+ PROGRAM & FUNDRAISING OVERVIEW



We hosted seven 18+ participants for NH19, and two for SH20 from Germany. However, programs from both cycles, which were scheduled to end in June 2020 and December 2020 respectively, had to be terminated earlier because of the Covid-19 pandemic. They were repatriated on 25 March 2020.

Due to the pandemic, the NH20 cycle was suspended. However, plans to restart the 18+ programs for the SH21 cycle are in place.

On the fundraising front, we faced challenges from potential sponsors who are giving priority to helping the underprivileged during this pandemic. The lack of a Treasury number that would allow tax exemption for our donors is also another setback to our fundraising efforts.



TRAINING, LEARNING & EDUCATION DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The year 2020 saw a tremendous change across the globe due to the pandemic and this brought about changes in the approach the world took in the way humans interacted, equipped themselves with education and self development as well as adjusting to new modalities.

In AFS Malaysia, we embraced the new world of training, learning and education. Since the start of 2020, we had ambitious plans to expand our Intercultural Learning programmes. This was especially because a huge investment had been made to train key staff and volunteers to become internationally qualified trainers on our very own Intercultural Learning (ICL) Programmes as well as qualified facilitators for the Global Competence Certificate (GCC) in the previous year. However, the pandemic put paid to that ambitious plan for 2020 and beyond. As a result, we embraced new learning platforms to ensure that our programmes can continue for the foreseeable future. New research-based training programmes were quickly designed with the help of our headquarters in New York to support the global demand.




This year also saw the implementation of the virtual Student Learning Journey Curriculum (SLJC) which was implemented in 2016. All AFS participants are now required to attend a virtual blended learning course prior to departure. AFS Malaysia was one of several partner countries to implement this locally for the benefit of Malaysian participants who were leaving for their exchanges. In addition and for the first time, three Malaysians were selected to become Global Facilitators for the SLJC programme and develop content with other facilitators across the network. The programme continues to become an integral part of the AFS participants' journey and we intend to expand our team of Global Facilitators towards this end.

The year 2020 also saw development in virtual offerings to our stakeholders. We offered the Virtual Orientation Facilitator's Workshop in July 2020 and will be offering similar opportunities in the near future. At the start of the pandemic, AFS Malaysia was also selected to conduct a GCC Special Edition for returning and stranded participants across the globe as a result of the pandemic and global lockdowns. Four of our GCC-trained Qualified Facilitators were selected to manage a cohort of 100 participants each through а month-long virtual orientation and support system. Once again, AFS Malaysia was recognized for its accomplishments within the network which has opened a window of opportunity to grow and develop further as a learning hub.





Towards year end, the GCC Qualified Facilitators were once again activated for yet another live learning experience, this time to facilitate a group of 100 Malaysian educators under the sponsorship of MCIS-Life in collaboration with AFS and the Ministry of Education, Malaysia. The educators attended a virtual GCC blended learning programme for five weeks and each week, they were facilitated in smaller groups for an interactive discussion on global concerns and ideas. The participants under the Ministry of Education comprised school teachers, education officers at state and national levels, lecturers and managers from public learning institutions among others. This programme garnered the support and recognition of the Ministry of Education for the educators to be certified on their participation in a programme under the professional development appraisal or Latihan Dalam Perkhidmatan (LADAP). Today, we have 100 GCC graduates among the educators in the Ministry of Education Malaysia who are not only the programme alumni but also active global citizens of the world. We are proud to have accomplished this and will continue to train more educators under the Intercultural Learning (ICL) and Global Competence Certificate (GCC) programmes.

GCC Special Edition


Following the worldwide repatriation of all AFS students, AFS International rolled out a GCC Special Edition program for students whose exchange experience was impacted by COVID-19. AFS Malaysia has a pool of trained GCC facilitators and five of them took up a facilitator role for the Special Edition. Considering the time difference, the group was assigned to students from Japan, Thailand, Indonesia, India, Malaysia and the Philippines. At the end of the program, the group received positive feedback from all the students expressing how much they enjoyed the sessions, especially having the platform to communicate with their peers who were going through the same experience as they were.

GCC At Home

Despite the challenging times, AFS Malaysia managed to secure a sponsorship of RM50,000.00 from MCIS Life to allow 100 teachers selected by the Ministry of Education Malaysia to attend an interactive Global Competence Certificate (GCC) online program,. The live sessions for the programs were all conducted by qualified staff and volunteers in a span of 5 weeks.

GCC Facilitators

AFS Malaysia had the foresight of preparing qualified facilitators so when the call for facilitators was announced, Malaysia responded promptly in volunteering our services to AFS International.



CHAPTER & VOLUNTEER DEVELOPMENT OVERVIEW



An entourage of 40 pax travelled to Perak for the 3 day-2 night event. There was representation from the Board, Staff, Chapters & Alumni.
